She has been recognized by the Department of Economic Development as the CT Small Businesswoman of the Year, the United Way's Woman of the Year in 2014 and the Rotary Paul Harris Fellow, the highest honor awarded to a Rotarian. Ellen Ebbs was born and educated in New York City, attending Aquinas Hall Academy and Fordham University. She has worked as a photojournalist for The Litchfield Enquirer, Waterbury Hospital in Behavioral Health and the Development Department, Charlotte Hospital as a grant writing consultant, chair of the hospital's Capital Campaign and Director of Development and Executive Director of the Cancer Care Fund. She has been involved in many nonprofit and volunteer initiatives and loves to cook and entertain, especially for her wonderful family and friends.

<u>Marie Soliani</u> was born, raised and has always lived in Torrington, having attended Torrington Public Schools where she met and married Enrico "Rico" Soliani. She founded the CT Chapter of the American Association of Medical Transcriptionists and the Torrington Chapter of the United Ostomy Association of America. Marie was a City Councilwoman in Torrington for 16 years having served on the Grievance Committee, Small Cities and Charter Revision. Marie has traveled extensively, through Australia, Egypt, Africa and Europe. She has succeeded in fulfilling her mission of spreading the word of this special place we call Torrington.

The recipients of the Quality of Life Award are two outstanding organizations: <u>Ebner Camps</u> and <u>The Litchfield County Opiate Task</u> <u>Force</u>. <u>Ebner Camps</u> is a household word for camping throughout this area. Its history began in 1900 established on Lake Awosting in Ellenville, NY eventually moving to Bantam Lake in Morris in the 1930's. Oscar Ebner, Sr. and his wife Virginia purchased the camp in 1948 that continues to thrive under their leadership and that of their children and grandchildren now in their third generation. In its many years of operating day camps, Ebner Camps has made an impact on the lives of over 30,000 children.

The Litchfield County Opiate Task Force was formed in 2013 following a devasting increase in overdose deaths. Led by co-chairs representing the McCall Center for Behavioral Health and Charlotte Hungerford Hospital, it has more than sixty active members from all sectors of the community and has taken on countless projects to address community needs and the root causes of addiction. Its goal is to improve access to care, enhance collaboration and data sharing among providers, reduce opioid use and misuse in the community.

#### **Northwestern Celebrates Milestone Commencement**



Northwestern Connecticut Community College celebrated a milestone this year at their 57<sup>th</sup> commencement ceremony on May 25, 2023: It was the last commencement as *NCCC*.

On July 1, Northwestern will merge with the other eleven Connecticut community colleges as the state becomes a one community college system.

"It is important to remind all of our graduates tonight, as well as their family and friends attending," President Michael Rooke said when he addressed the graduates at The Warner Theatre, "Northwestern will continue to thrive in the northwest corner as *Connecticut State Community College, Northwestern*, providing exceptional services to our students. We will always be here to support you, wherever the next chapter of your life leads."

To further mark the event, graduates received a commemorative pin upon arrival with the inscription: *Honoring Our Past, Securing Our Future.* 

Family and friends were able to view a presentation of historical pictures from the last fifty-seven years prior to the start of the event, which opened traditionally with bagpiper, Ken Storrs, leading the processional. Faculty member, Maureen Chambers, who has been at the college for more than thirty years, performed the duties of Grand Marshal. The audience also watched a congratulatory cameo video from actor Luis Guzman prior to the speeches.

Connecticut Board of Regents Chair, JoAnn Ryan brought greetings and congratulations to the graduates from the Board of Regents with gratitude to families, friends, as well as faculty and staff for helping students achieve their goals. "To the Class of 2023, you are the future of Connecticut," she said, "And I offer all of you my sincere congratulations."

Graduate Luis S. Sanchez-Chiriboga addressed his fellow graduates as student speaker. Sanchez-Chiriboga acknowledged the hard work it took for all his peers to graduate and encouraged all graduates to continue to believe in themselves and their future. "We have overcome enormous challenges to reach this moment, and we should be proud," he said. "As we look ahead, let's remember the obstacles we've faced and the power we have within us. With hard work and determination, anything is possible." Sanchez-Chiriboga also served as the Board of Regents student regent this past year and was involved in campus activities. He plans to continue his studies at Central Connecticut State University in the fall.

"We are very proud to have had a student from our campus serve on the Board of Regents," said Rooke. "Luis has worked hard in this capacity to represent students and we are honored to have been a part of his educational journey."

President and CEO of Northwest Community Bank, its divisions and parent company, Stephen Reilly, delivered the commencement speech and had sage advice for the graduates: Have a strong work ethic, find a mentor to support your goals, and always be kind in all your interactions. Reilly, who is retiring from Northwest Community Bank this year has been an active volunteer in the community and has been a long-standing board member of the college Foundation and supporter of the campus. "You are the future and I have great confidence in our future because of what we are witnessing tonight," Reilly said.

Approximately one-hundred students of the eligible 169 attended the event. All total, Northwestern awarded 189 degrees and certificates this Spring.

"Our students face many challenges to earn their degree." said Rooke, "Commencement is a time for students and families to be proud of all they have accomplished."

#### Gunn Memorial Library & Hickory Stick Bookshop Present: Author Talk with Seh-lynn Chai

The Gunn Memorial Library is pleased to collaborate with the Hickory Stick Bookshop to host an author talk at Judy Black Memorial Park and Garden on **Saturday, June 3 at 3 pm** with Seh-lynn Chai, co-author of *The Hard Road Out: One Woman's Escape from North Korea.* 

*The Hard Road Out* details the survival story of Jihyun Park, who by the age of 29 had witnessed more unspeakable horrors than anyone should. Family members had died of starvation; her brother was beaten nearly to death by soldiers. Even smiling and laughing was discouraged. The first time she ran, she was forced to abandon her father on his deathbed – crossing the border under a hail of bullets. In China she was sold to a farmer, with whom she had a son, before being denounced and forcibly returned to North Korea.

Thirty-five years of Japanese colonization (1910 – 1945) and subsequent 70 years of division post Korean war (1950 -1953) shaped a divided Korea and created a culture of distrust and hatred. Yet Chai's 2014 encounter with Park challenged those notions and opened many windows of Chai's life that had remained closed for too long.

Clear-eyed and resolute, Jihyun's extraordinary story reveals a Korea far removed from the talk of nuclear weapons and economic sanctions. She remains sanguine despite the hardship. Recalling life's tiny pleasures even at her darkest moments, she manages to instill her tale with incredible grace and humanity.

Seh-lynn Chai is sharing her story of meeting Park and the process of writing this book to give us an opportunity to reflect on the place of the past in the present and to ask ourselves what can bring people together.
