

CELEBRATION OF SUCCESS: ABOUT THE NOMINEES

Jacque Anthony Williams hails from Dayton, Ohio. He was born in Hamilton, Ohio. Jacque is the only child of Mary Lucinda Williams (Mai Mai) and U.S. Air Force Msgt Jimmie (J.J). Johnson. Jacque grew up in the Air Force at Wright Patterson Air Force Base and was educated in the Mad River School District. Jacque attended Walter E. Stebbins and graduated from Trotwood Madison High School.

Jacque attended Sinclair Community College and the University of Dayton where he majored in Business Education and minored in Music Theatre. Jacque was very active in Community theatre and landed roles in many college and community theatre productions. Jacque started his professional pursuits in a research project for the N.C.R. corporation called "Operation San Francisco" which was a test market program to evaluate the effectiveness of telemarketing to residential and commercial prospects. Jacque states that the experience prepared him appropriately

on how to accept rejection. "At least on the telephone people couldn't see the look on my face when prospects told me'NO'!!" Jacque started utilizing the communication skills he was learning and worked with the local Chamber in Dayton to build relationships, network and get a better understanding of how small business works. So Jacque decided to utilize what he learned and take his talents to the Big Apple to work with B.M.I. (Broadcast Music Inc) to start his music publishing company and continue networking with industry stakeholders. Around that time, there were conversations about New Haven and the music scene happening in the Yale creative community. Jacque relocated to New Haven and started performing, and producing with many of the artists in the community and started to get his name out in the Connecticut music scene as a singer/songwriter producer and performer. One of the artists Jacque worked with was a Hart School of Music graduate and invited Jacque to move to this milltown in the N.W. Hills of Connecticut that was transitioning into an arts & culture destination. It was a great move and allowed Jacque to continue his work in New York City being located in the "90 minute market" of the N.W. Hills of Torrington Connecticut.

Jacque was very heartened by the reception that he received when he relocated to Torrington. "I had to make a few changes in my business plan to adapt to the changes that were taking place in the industry but, I did not plan on the warmth and friendliness that the Torrington Community demonstrated to me when I decided to make my home here." That was over 25 years ago. Since that time Jacque has volunteered countless hours in helping forge many of the initiatives that Torrington has created. In 2009 Jacque was asked to serve on the newly formed Torrington Arts & Culture Commission aka A.C.T. Jacque was instrumental in helping the arts & culture commission become relevant downtown and building the arts as an economic engine in Torrington and throughout N.W. Connecticut. Jacque

co-chaired the commission and also chaired the "Artspace Initiative" which is now Five Points Center For The Visual Arts. Jacque also coordinated the entertainment for Main Street Market Place which was recognized by the Connecticut Office of the Arts in 2012 as a "Main Street Project" award recipient. Jacque was also asked to serve on the "Superintendent's Curriculum Advisory Committee" under former school Superintendent Chris Leone. In 2016 Jacque was unanimously elected to serve on the N.W. Connecticut's area Chamber Of Commerce. In 2017 Jacque served as a

committee member on the "Working Cities Challenge." This exercise was developed by the Boston Federal Reserve as a way for cities to come up with innovative ways that included inclusion and diversification to meet and overcome demographic changes that are taking place in many cities across the country.

Jacque currently works as an on-air personality 3 days a week at local Torrington community radio station W.A.P.J. (105.1 89.9 streaming worldwide wapj.org) Jacque has been with the radio station for 10 years and his show the "Feel Good Show" airs Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 10am until noon. Jacque also hosts the 20 year long running cable access tv show "City Views" which airs on local cable access Altice channel 5 for those living in Torrington and Litchfield County. Jacque is the co-founder of "Culture 4 A Cause" a non-profit whose mission is to build community through music & the arts. Jacque's company Jacque Williams Entertainment specializes in weddings and special events. Jacque has been selected as the new chairman of the gov't relations committee. He is in the process of launching his new podcast "Jacque Williams is M.A.D....Making a Difference" on or around the 4th of July. The podcast will focus on the stakeholders in our region and selling the Torrington narrative to new audiences developed in the state and throughout the country!!

Mission: to champion and nurture artists at all stages of their careers and to empower a diverse community through the presentation of inspiring exhibitions and educational initiatives.

The Gallery

Five Points grew out of the Torrington Arts and Culture Commission's 2012 initiative, Art Space Torrington, a temporary 840 square foot summer storefront gallery located in the heart of Torrington's historic downtown district. The success of the summer initiative led to the founding of Five Points Gallery, a permanent non-profit 501(c)(3) visual arts organization dedicated to the belief that contemporary art is a vital component of human understanding. In 2013, the new gallery, named after its location at the five-point intersection in the heart of downtown Torrington, expanded to an adjacent

storefront creating a contiguous 3800 square foot space composed of three beautifully renovated galleries. The Gallery mounts new exhibits every six weeks showcasing professional regional, national and international visual artists. Since its opening, the Gallery has exhibited over 800 artists, and boasts artists' submissions from around the globe including China, Russia, Japan, Israel, Greece, England, Denmark, Germany, France, and

49 states in the US. The guest book is similarly impressive. Five Points Gallery's success has become symbolic of Torrington's rebirth as an arts destination. The innovative curatorial stance and commitment to excellence have made the Five Points Gallery one of Connecticut's most sought-after exhibition spaces. Art New England has lauded Five Points Gallery as" One of 4 New England Galleries Worth the Drive."

The Launchpad

In answer to the growing needs of art school graduates, and to encourage the cross pollination of ideas, The Launchpad, a strategic partnership with Hartford Art School, University of Hartford was formed in 2016. Emerging artists who have been severed from the umbilical connection of guidance, direction, community and art facilities found in a degree program, often face an uncertain future that, for the most part, has to be negotiated independently. Often working in their parents' basements or garages, many promising young artists find themselves isolated without intellectual and creative

stimulation. The Launchpad program offers participants access to affordable shared studio spaces above Five Points Gallery, a serious arts community, mentorship, exhibition and gallery management opportunities, as well as a biennial exhibition in Five Points Gallery.

The Annex

After a complete renovation, The Annex, a non-juried first come first served community pop-up gallery opened its doors in 2017. The Annex offers Launchpad artists the experience of managing a professional gallery space, adding business experience and community relations to their resumes. The Annex is available to regional artists and artisans and provides an affordable professional space to showcase their work. Since its opening, The Annex has exhibited more than 400 local and regional artists and artisans. The Annex hosts the annual Draw-A-Thon, juried shows, school groups and other organizations.

The Art Center

In June of 2020 after more than two years of negotiation, Five Points finalized the purchase of the former University of Connecticut Torrington Regional campus. Located 4 miles from downtown Torrington and two hours from New York and Boston, the property includes a 30,000 square foot building and 90 acres of land. When the campus opportunity came to Five Points' attention in 2018

- Judith McElhone acted. "This came out of left field and it was so right to continue our mission to support artists and the community, and to give artists and community members the equipment, facilities and support they need to make their art." Envisioned as a dynamic fulcrum for cutting edge exploration and community driven activity, Five Points is in the process of transforming the property into a world-class art center the likes of which have not been seen before in Northwest Connecticut. Connecting emerging artists with recognized established artists will be a crucial part of the new center, namely through the Lynchpin Program, a think tank through which artists can share ideas and create thought provoking innovative art. When the Center is fully operational artists will have access to workspaces equipped for Printmaking, Alternative Photograph Processing, Ceramics, Digital Art, Sculpture, Painting, Drawing and 3-D fabrication. The 245-seat auditorium will offer artist talks and documentaries. Visitors will be able to

enroll in workshops, drop their kids off at the Children's Lab, enjoy a snack from the Café, explore the library with over 1000 publications, browse the gift shop, meditate in the Courtyard Sensory Garden, walk the Art Park's paths and trails (with four legged friends), create, explore, relax and learn!

Five Points Arts has significantly contributed to the revitalization of Torrington through the establishment of the Five Points Gallery as a premier art venue in Connecticut. Art enthusiasts are drawn to the region from all over the United States and nine countries. The Art Center is a transformative

multi-year project that will further the positive impact of the arts in this area. The initiative has already drawn collaborative interest from the University of Hartford, Parsons, Rhode Island School of Design and other colleges and universities, and organizations.

Supporting arts, culture and tourism is a cornerstone of Northwest Connecticut's Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy. The Art Center will attract young people to the region, create jobs, and strengthen Northwest Connecticut's identity as a center for arts innovation.

A full economic recovery requires an immune workforce and

consumer-base. To this end, and to continue increasing vaccine uptake, distribution and dispensing efforts must become more mobile and flexible, outreach and education efforts must be more

tailored, and partnerships between and among employers and business organizations with health care providers must be taken to the next level.

By combining forces, Hartford HealthCare and the NW Chamber of Commerce has organized a membership vaccine outreach program. All Chamber members will be offered an opportunity to request vaccinations for their employees, and depending on demand, can arrange on-site vaccinations, participate in near-by mobile vaccination sites, or arrange clinic access with reserved appointment times for their workforce.

Charlotte Hungerford Hospital, a partner of Harford HealthCare, has set up a mobile team of clinicians and have eliminated registration and appointment hassles many have

encountered to date. As requests from Chamber Members are received, we will schedule our mobile team with an emphasis on arranging as many on-site vaccinations as possible. Secondarily, in some cases a near-by central mobile vaccine distribution site will be established to which several businesses can participate will be arranged such as in an industrial park. Finally, the option of priority appointments at fixed clinics sites in Torrington can be arranged.

CHH AND TORRINGTON LIONS CLUB LOW VISION CENTER NOW AT SKY TOP PLAZA OFFERS HELP TO PATIENTS WITH SIGHT LIMITATIONS

TORRINGTON, Conn. Are you or someone you know experiencing the challenges of low vision? Charlotte Hungerford Hospital and the Lions Club Low Vison Centers of Hartford and Litchfield counties partner together to help by provide free medical and financial support to those affected by assessing their sight limitations.

The Lions Low Vision Center is now located at the Hartford HealthCare Rehabilitation Network office at the Sky Top Plaza, 1012 East Main Street in Torrington. The service is provided by appointment by Registered Occupational Therapist, Michelle Whitford, who has extensive training in low vision diagnoses and treatment.



"Low vision affects over two thirds of adults over 65 years of age. It's our goal to ensure that older adults with low vision are able to maintain their independence and experience quality of life." Said Michelle Whitford.

Macular degeneration, glaucoma, history of stroke or Diabetes, are the most common medical conditions causing low vision. Simple tasks may become more difficult and frustration often occurs with low vision. Although low vision can't be corrected, there are many ways to make daily tasks easier.

Low vision is a condition that can't be corrected by medical, surgical intervention or by eyeglasses. It limits an individual's ability to complete many daily



activities, which may include any of the following examples: reading and signing forms, reading the number on a clock, or difficulties location steps, curbs, or items within one's home.

"Our hospital is pleased to partner with the Lions as we are inspired by them. The Center is really made possible by their resources and encouragement." Said Brian Mattiello, VP of Strategy and Community Development at the Hartford HealthCare Northwest Region.

Patients begin with an assessment to determine their degree of vison loss and then an individualized plan is created with specific goals focused on providing assistance and improving their quality of life. Strategies are then developed to help people perform daily tasks, at home using tactile and talking products. Individuals are educated on availability of assistance technologies and learn to use their remaining vision effectively and live more safely and independently.

The Lions Low Vision Centers supplies any devices a patient may need free of charge and may also assist on the financial hardship situations. 

NCCC OFFERS ADVANCED MANUFACTURING SYSTEMS CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

Winsted – Northwestern Connecticut Community College will offer Advanced Manufacturing Systems training this fall, which will provide students with more than 100 hours of training toward a certified apprentice program. Although restrictions apply, businesses may qualify to receive free training for their employees.



"We are excited to offer this opportunity for students who are looking to further advance their education and training in the field of manufacturing," said Gary Carra, Interim Director of Business, Technology and Industry Training for Northwestern. 
Topics to be covered will include: Shop Math, Overview of Blueprint, Geometric Dimensioning and Tolerancing, Overview of Mechanical Maintenance, and Overview of Industrial Maintenance. Training will be one day a week for a duration of two semesters allowing training to be complete in less than a year. Students who complete the program will receive a certificate issued by Northwestern through the Connecticut College of Technology.

"Completion of the program will also qualify students to enroll in a certified state apprentice program, allowing for further training and advancement opportunities," said Carra.

I had the privilege of representing the Board of Regents for the Connecticut State College and University System last week at the Northwestern Connecticut Community College Celebration.
